

# UP Police Mock Test With Question Review

GK is the biggest score-fluctuation section.

- Mark questions you *knew vs assumed*
- Identify static vs current-heavy mistakes
- Track repeat topics (polity, history, geography)

A UP Police Mock Test helps you identify whether GK failure is due to **poor revision or poor recall**.

## **Reasoning: Pattern Recognition Is Everything**

Reasoning questions repeat logic, not numbers.

During review:

- Check if you misread conditions
- Identify time-wasting question types

If the same reasoning mistake appears twice, it's not accidental, it's a blind spot.

## **Numerical Ability: Selection Errors Cost Marks**

Math is not about solving all questions.

Review should focus on:
